

#5 Kingdom Implications

<u>Mark 1:14-15 (NIV)</u> After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. ¹⁵ "The time has come," he said. "The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!"

Acts 1:3 (NIV) After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God.

IMPLICATIONS of living at this point in the story:

- 1. We're to be living in KINGDOM of God realities **NOW**
 - 1) **IDENTITY**
 - <u>**1 Corinthians 15:57 (NIV)**</u> But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.
 - 2) Power over SIN

Romans 8:1-2 (NIV) Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, ² because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit who gives life has set you free from the law of sin and death.

3) Truly embracing **GRACE** instead of **RELIGION**

2. We're to be **DIFFERENCE-MAKERS** in our culture for the sake of **ADVANCING** the Kingdom!

<u>Matthew 6:9-10 (NIV)</u> This, then is how you should pray: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, ¹⁰ your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

- 1. What kinds of kingdom-minded things should our family be focused on?
- 2. How do you think God could use you to make a diference in the world?
- 3. When someone receives grace, they receive something they don't deserve. How can we show grace to each other in our family?
