## THE PARABLE OF THE UNJUST JUDGE

<u>Luke 18:1</u> Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up. <u>2</u> He said: "In a certain town there was a judge who neither feared God nor cared about men. <u>3</u> And there was a widow in that town who kept coming to him with the plea, 'Grant me justice against my adversary.'

<u>Luke 18:4</u> "For some time he refused. But finally he said to himself, 'Even though I don't fear God or care about men, <u>5</u> yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will see that she gets justice, so that she won't eventually wear me out with her coming!"

<u>Luke 18:6</u> And the Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. <u>7</u> And will not God bring about justice for his chosen ones, who cry out to him day and night? Will he keep putting them off? <u>8</u> I tell you, he will see that they get justice, and quickly. However, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on the earth?"
